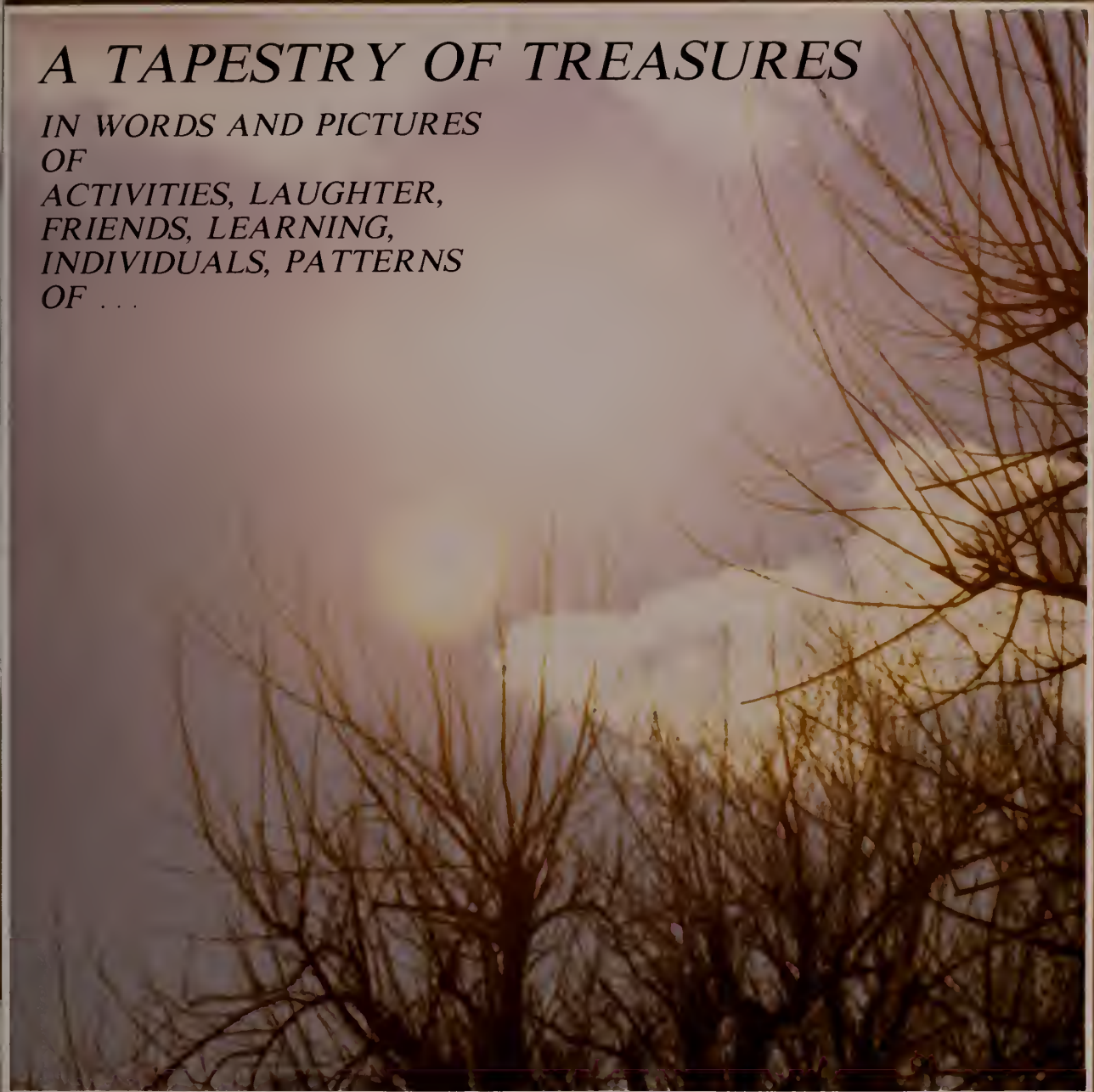

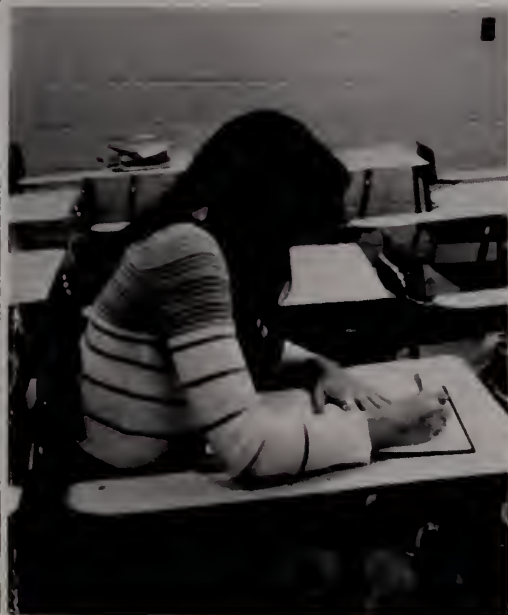
THE THREAD OF LEARNING MUST BE STRONG

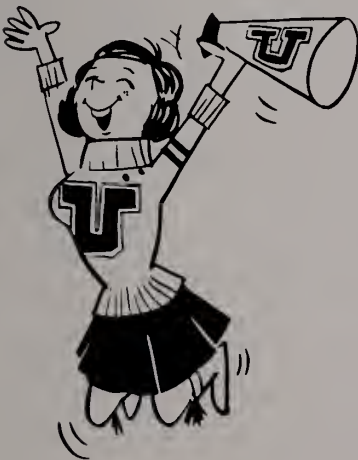

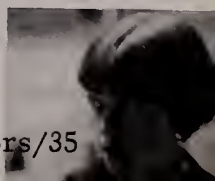

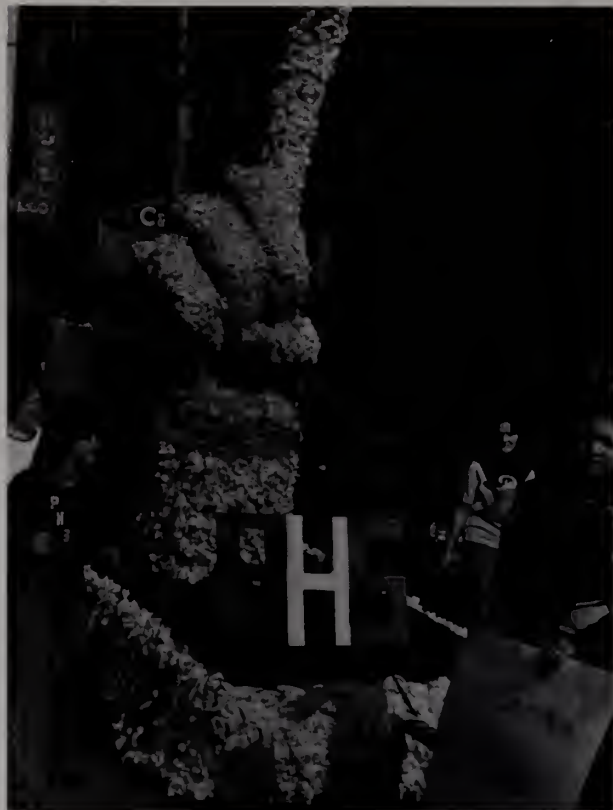


On September 30, 1977, the first annual Coming Home Dance was held. Everything including the court was a reversed version of Homecoming.

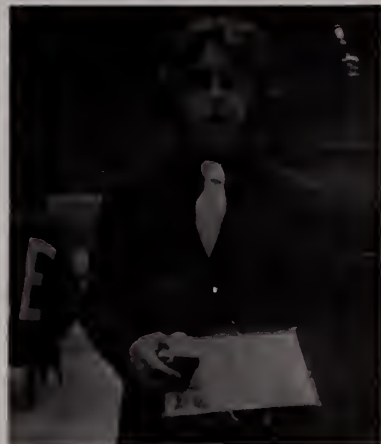


AWARDS — A GEM OF A DAY

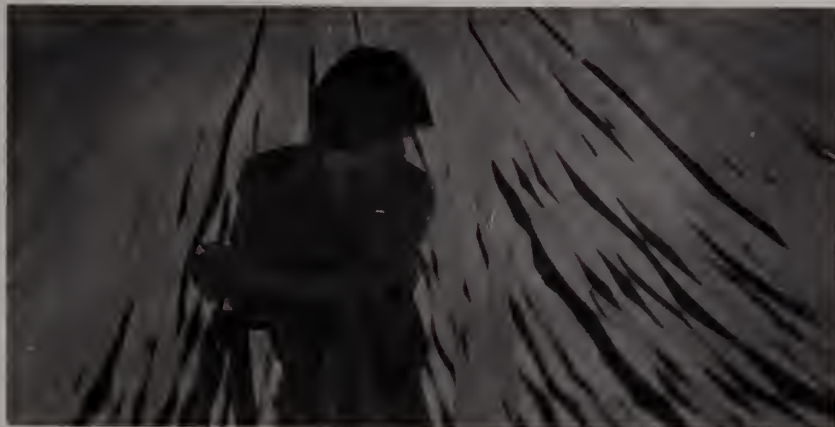

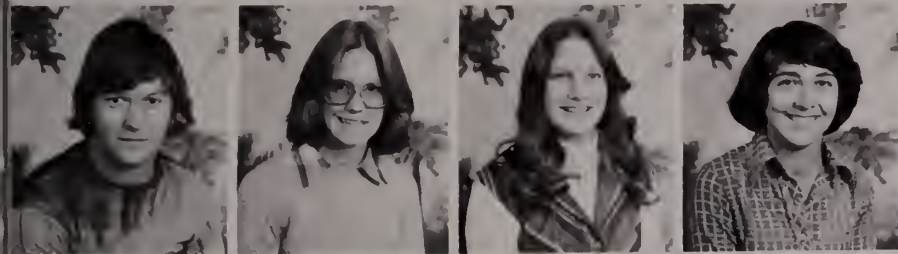

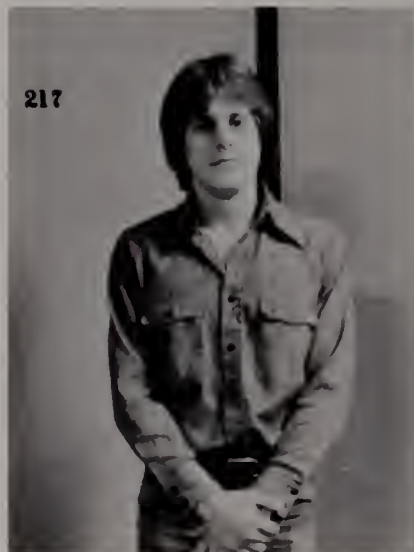
BAND COUNCIL AND OTHER HONORS

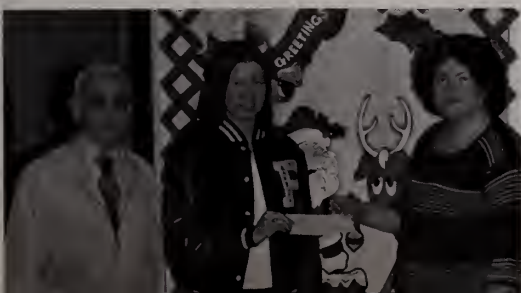
