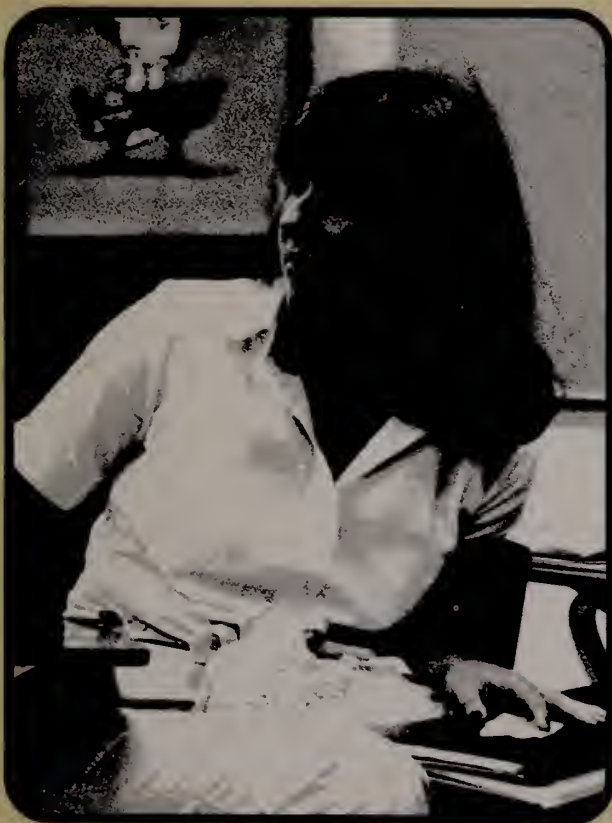

THERE'S A SMILE IN ALL OF US

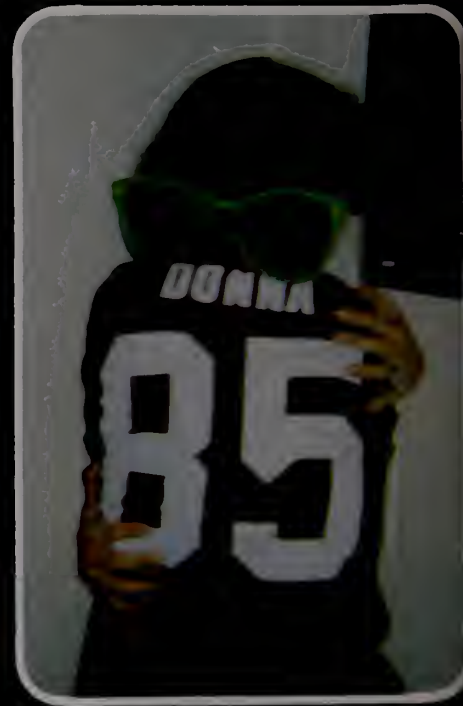

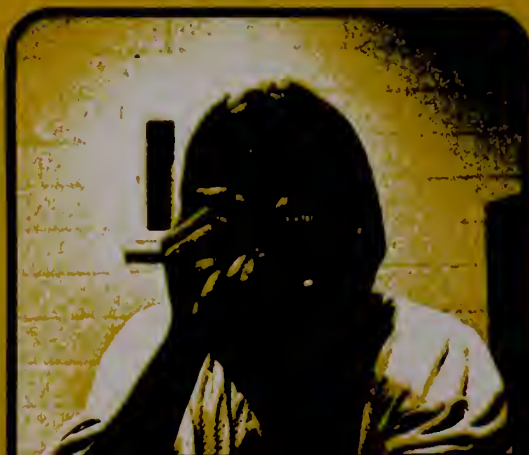
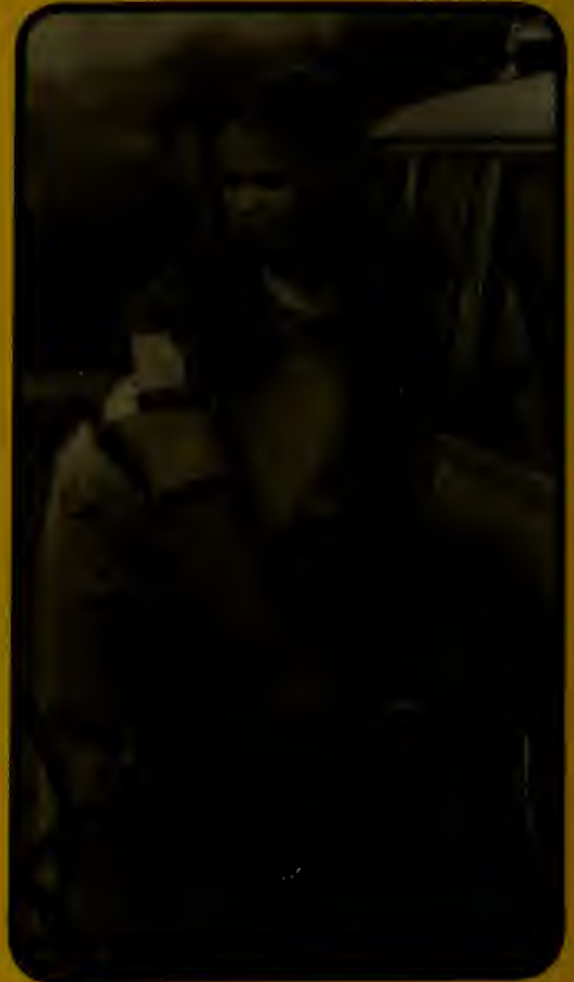
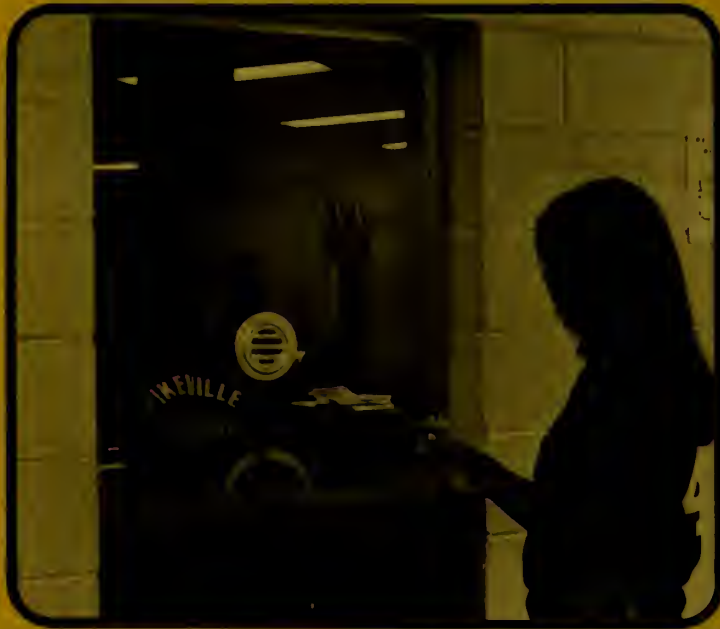

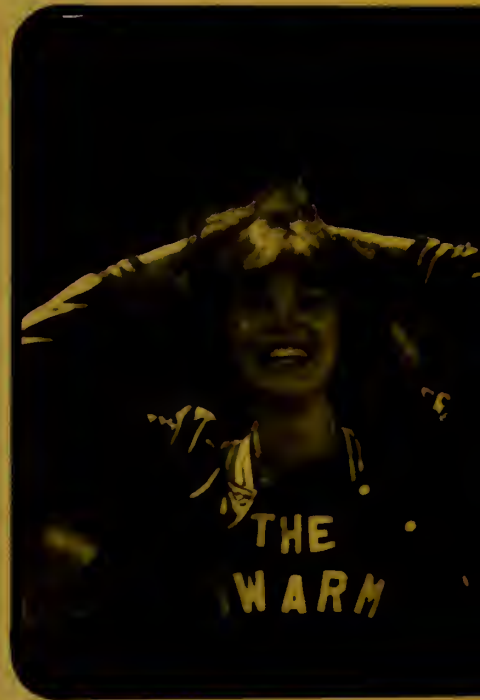




WILL WE EVER FORGET . . .

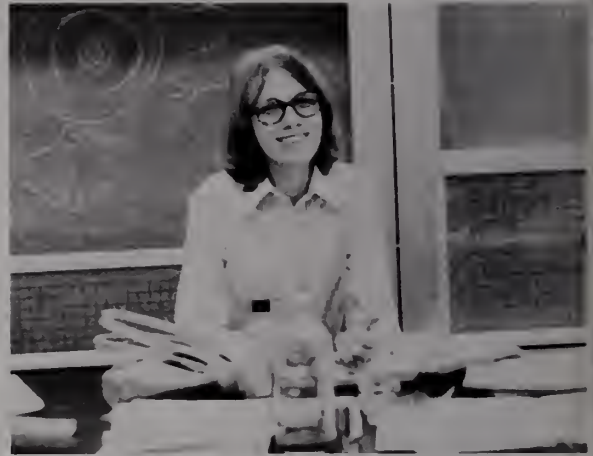

Before The Exercises

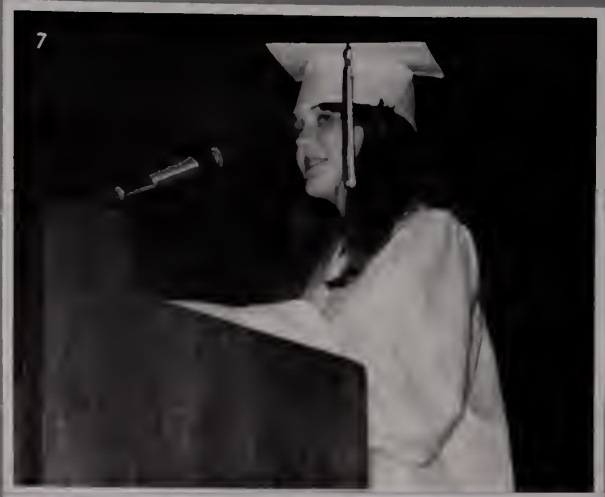

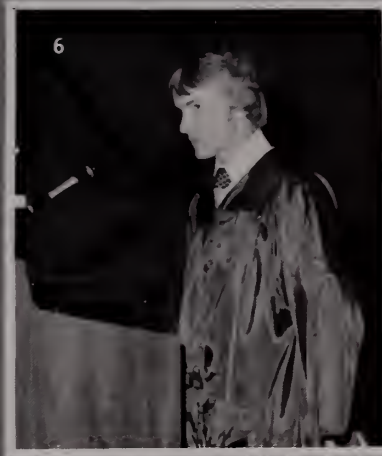

The Guest Speaker

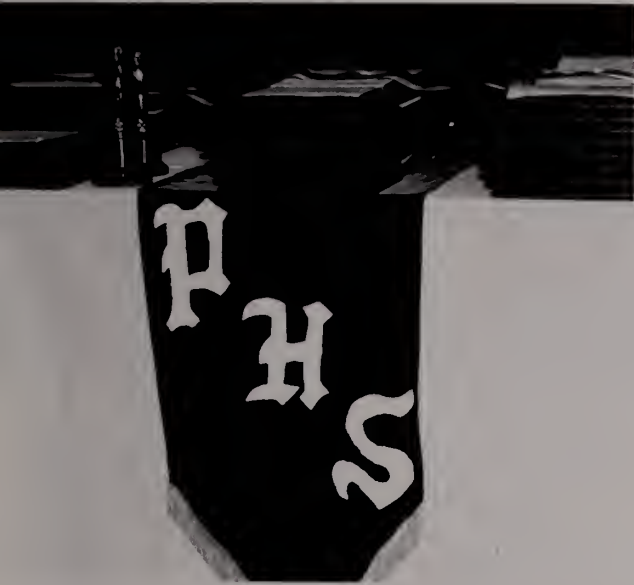

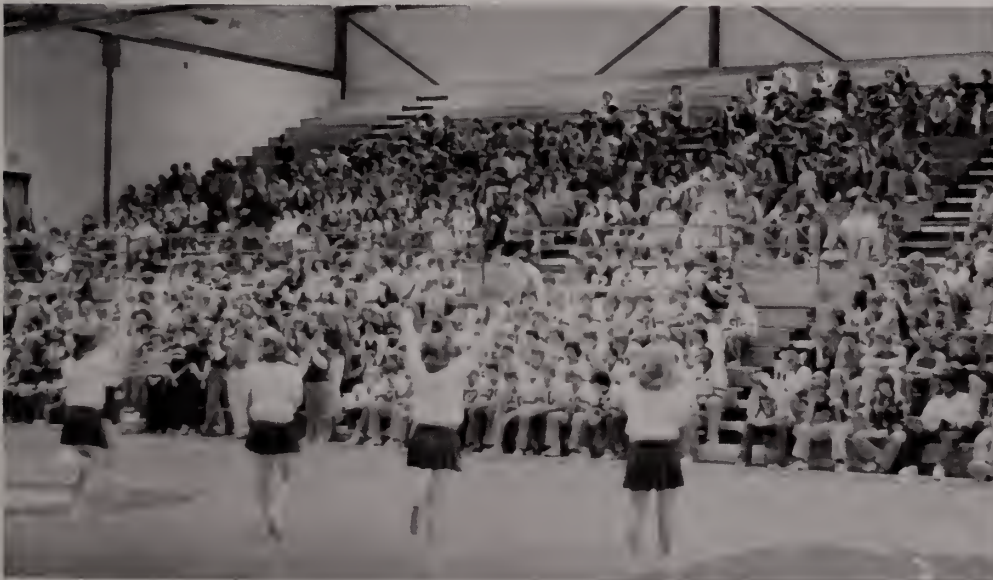

No matter what type of activity it may be, we outshine them all. Life may not be a bowl of cherries, but these academic bowls are just a bit of proof that we are the best in everything we do.



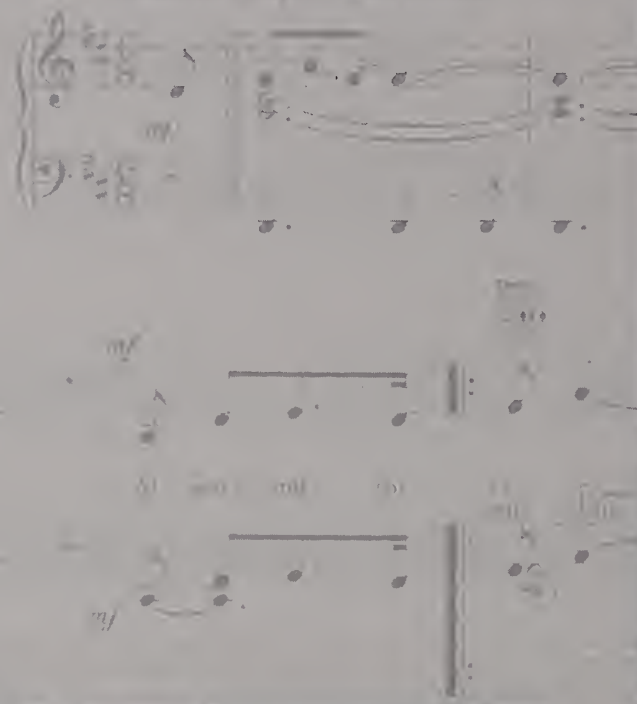

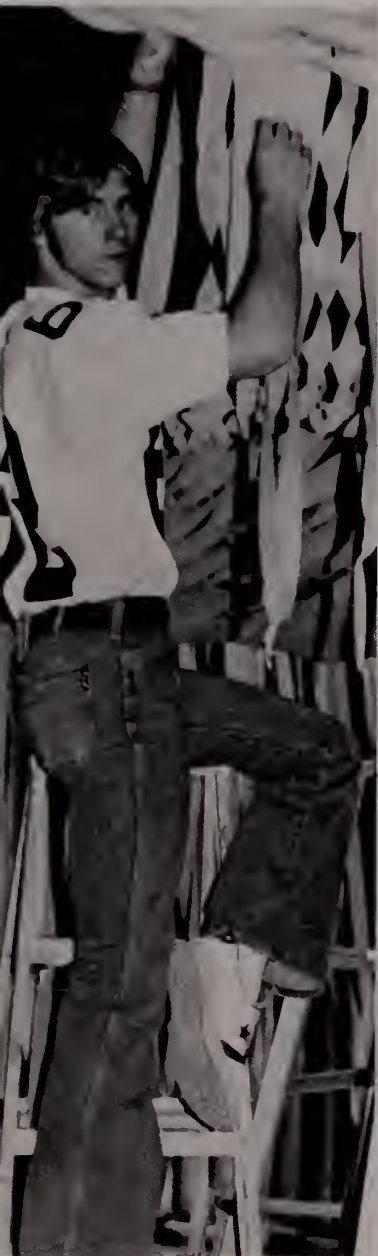

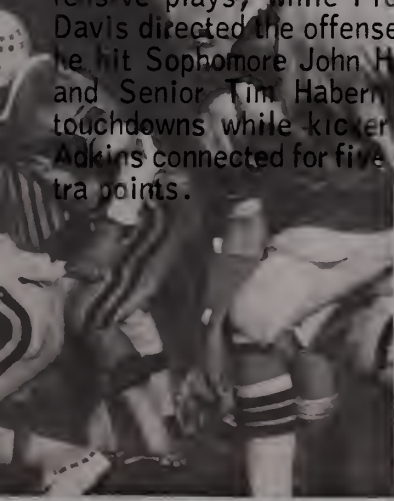
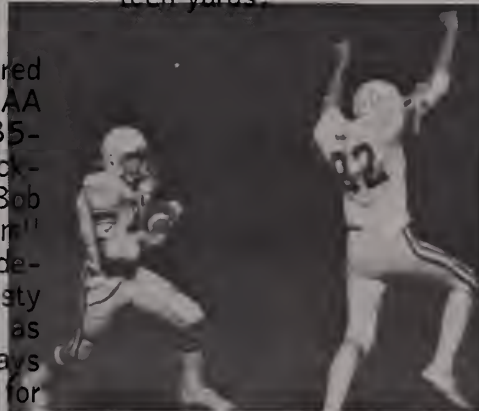
Elkhorn City

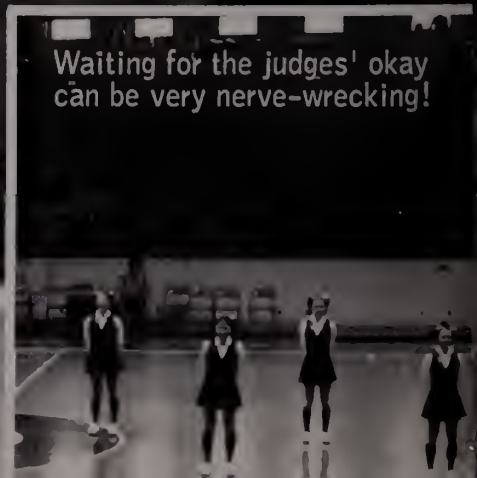

PUMPING IRON —



We live in an age of startling athletic performances. Not only are we in the midst of a record explosion, but the average level of athletic performance has risen greatly. There have been advances in equipment, techniques, and other training methods, but the wide-spread use of weight training has been the single biggest factor behind the record explosion. Faithful practice, good conditioning, and plenty of competition are needed, but it is now clear that weight training is also needed.

Most athletic events require a certain amount of power, and in these events, form is simply the efficiency with which power is applied. Power is achieved by weight training and by running short distances at full speed.

If you are training for an event that requires great strength or explosive power, you will lift heavy weights a few times. If your event requires endurance rather than power you will lift less weight more times. Believe it or not, your body is capable of performing about any phys-

ical task you want it to. The tougher the task, the tougher it makes your body, when you practice performing it. Exercise must be carried out at regular intervals. The body responds best to a schedule that includes regular exercise followed by periods of rest. In weight-training, poundage is gradually increased as the body becomes ready to accept increases.

Weight training has produced such spectacular results that the original attitude of distrust toward the method has turned to one of unbelieving awe and praise! If muscles are to become stronger they must be worked hard and exercised regularly. Without some form of exercise your muscles will become weak and small.

The great value of weight-training lies in the control and precision that it permits. Like all other athletes, those at Pikeville High are striving to excel in their particular sport by utilizing weight training in their total fitness program.

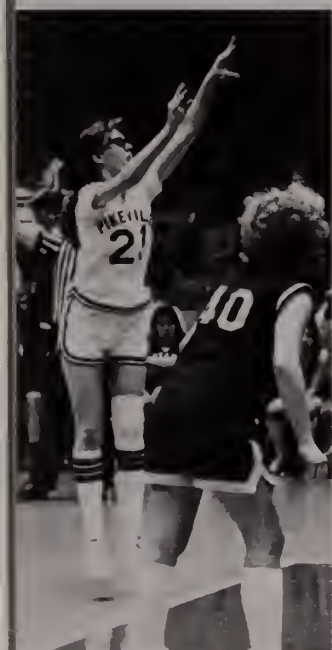

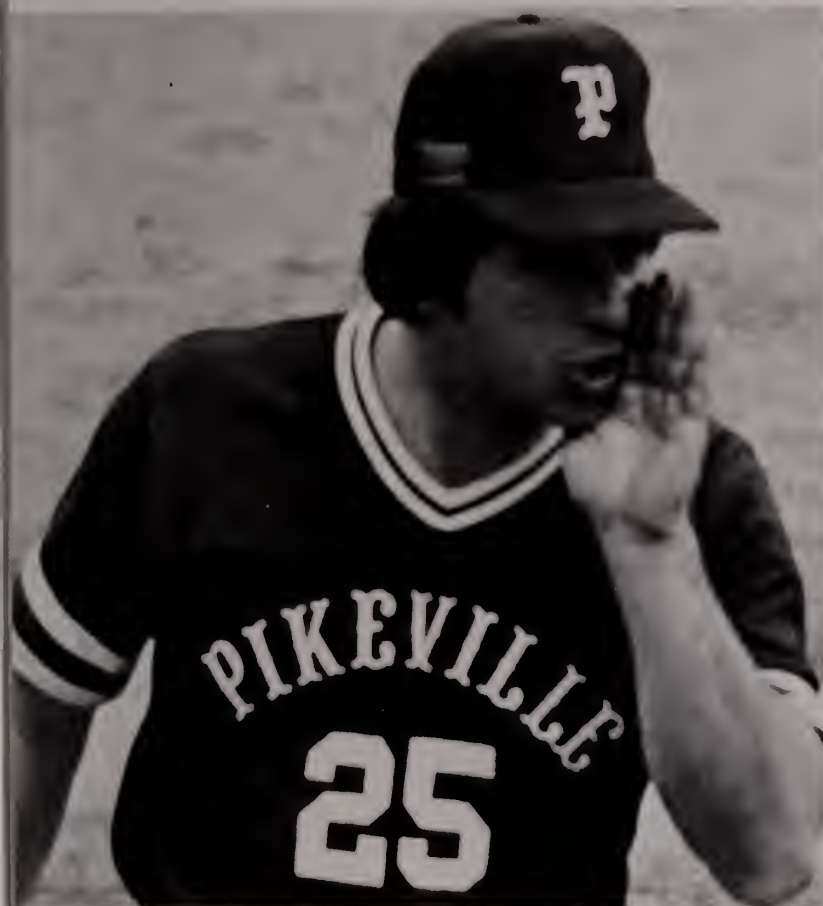

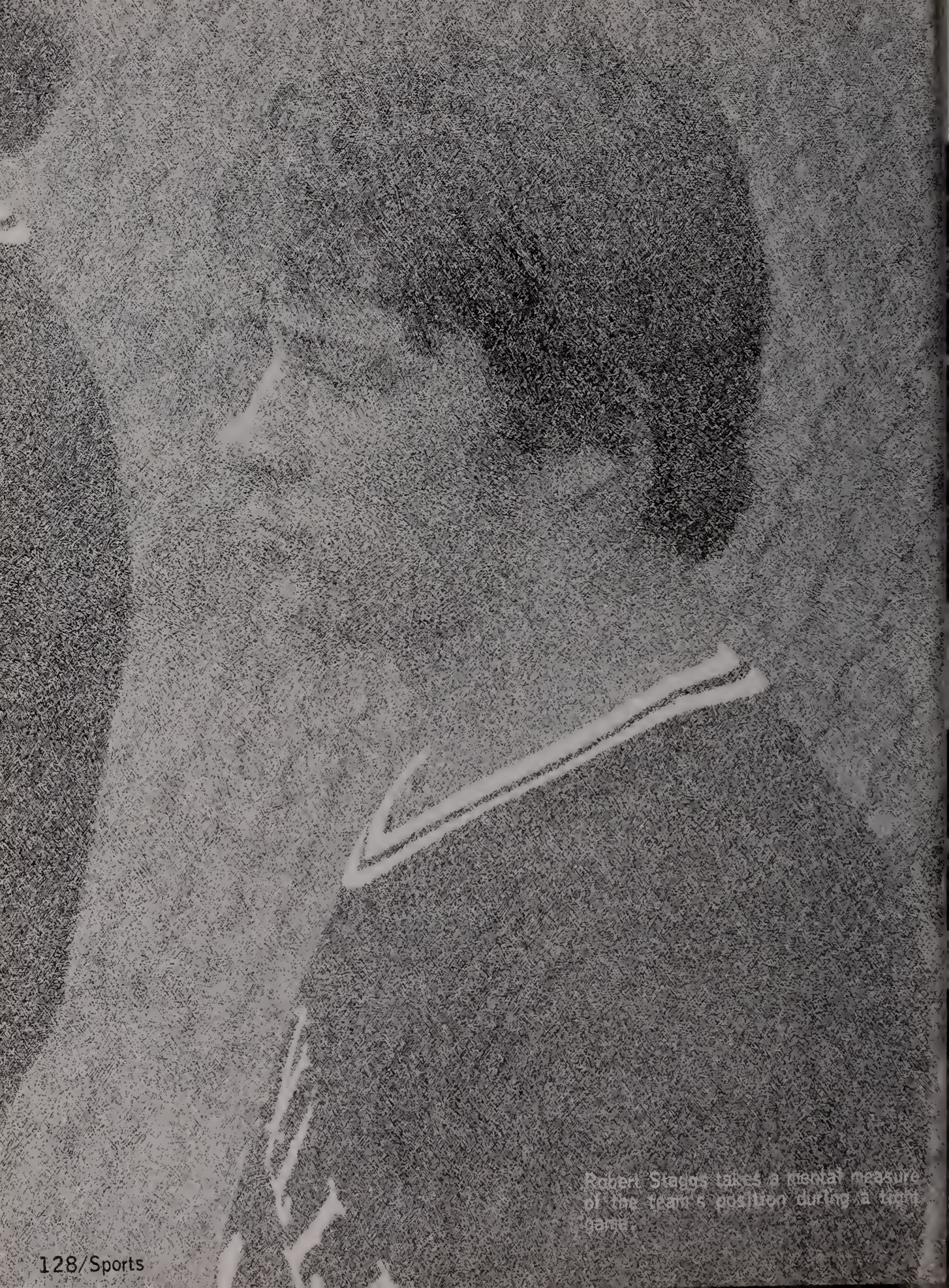

Present friends and making new friends were a very important part of daily activities at school. Most Freshmen felt that by being in high school they had the opportunity to meet people and make new friends.

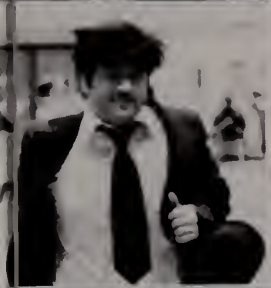

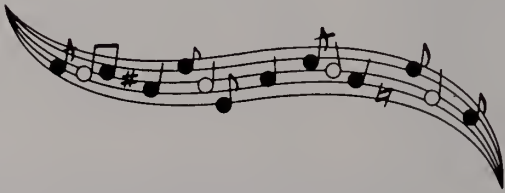

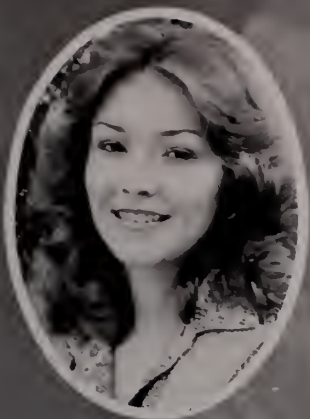

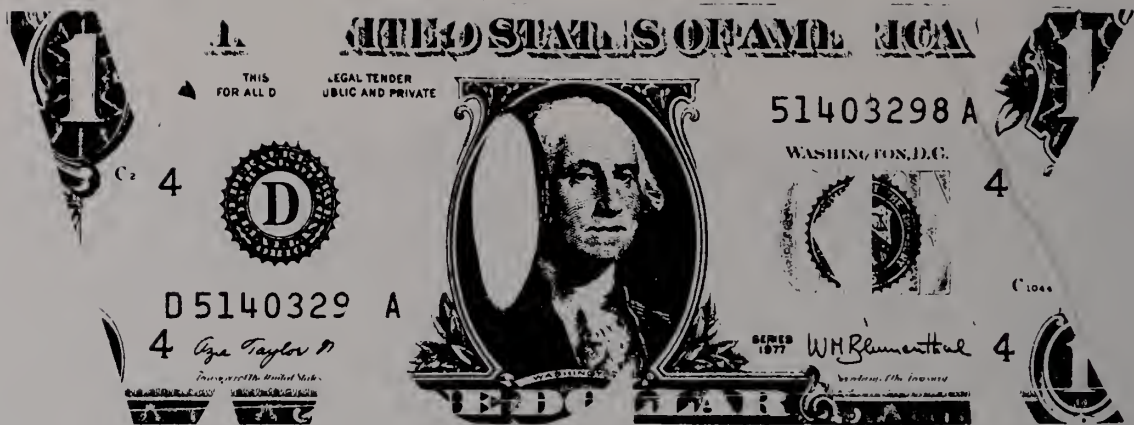

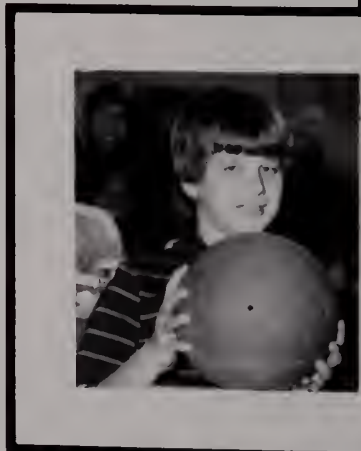
