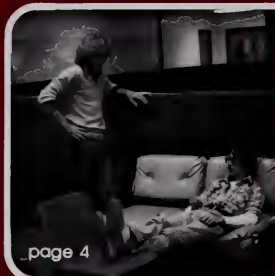
A PANTHER TALE attempts to capture the people, the setting and mood of our school by allowing none other than the Pink Panther himself to show and guide you through the school year 1979-80.

Allow the Pink Panther to present this year to you, page by page, to revive your memories of the time when you were a major part of all this activity. Here is his story . . .

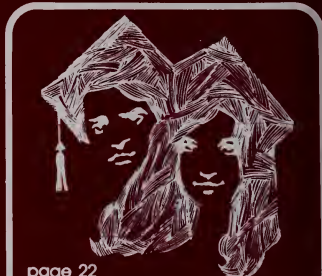

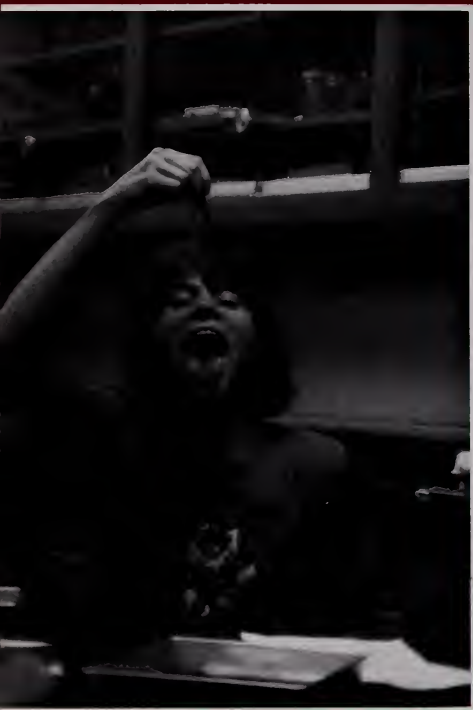

**Olympic Committee Plans Own Games**

Our lives as students were not entirely encased in a classroom; happenings in our state and world also had great effect on every day lives. Through use of the news media, students became frightened for the fifty Americans held hostage by students at the United States Embassy in Iran and felt somewhat bitter towards the man responsible for their abductions — the Ayatollah Khomeini. This Khomeini, the Shiite religious leader was chosen by Time Magazine as Man of the Year. Also hitting the headlines was Russian invasion of Afghanistan. This move in direct conflict to the United Nations and international law also prompted several countries, including Moscow, to boycott the 1980 Summer Olympics, if held in Moscow.

Kane said Saturday that the executive board was "buying more time" on a somewhat more pleasant note was Pope John Paul's visit to the U.S. This was the first time the Pope of the Roman Catholic Church paid refuge to Americans.

He said he did not fault Carter for pressing the Olympics issue.

At the political stand-point in the news, the race for the Democratic presidential nomination caused many disturbances. The question was, who would it be? Carter — incumbent president of the U.S., or Kennedy — brother of the notable late President John F. Kennedy. Statewide newspapers held contests of the newly-elected governor John Y. Brown — multi-millionaire and owner of the Kentucky Fried Chicken, franchisee of McDonald's and awarded by his side, was Phyllis George Brown, his wife, a former Miss America and CBS sportscaster.

He had said the Americans should be self-reliant, eventually doing away with the aid of the U.S.

Bani Sadr, a wealthy Iranian, was named by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs as Iran's first ambassador to the U.S. Embassies were seized Nov. 4. He has duties on Nov. 28, Sadeq Ghotbzadeh is expected to be appointed as Iran's first ambassador to the U.S.

Sadr continued to serve as Iran's finance minister for president.

Born in western Iran, Sadr became a politician in the early 1950s when he was named as Iranian prime minister by Mossadegh. He served in the national assembly and drove the country to the brink of bankruptcy from the U.S. aid program.

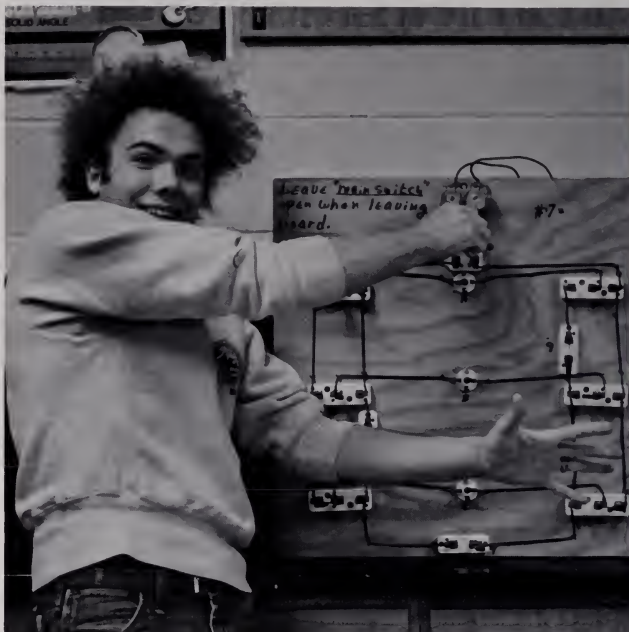

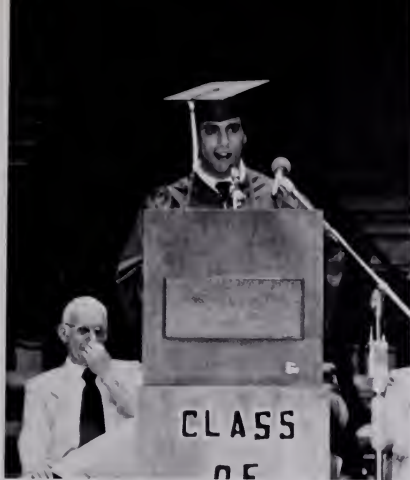

# Listening To In the World Of Entertainment



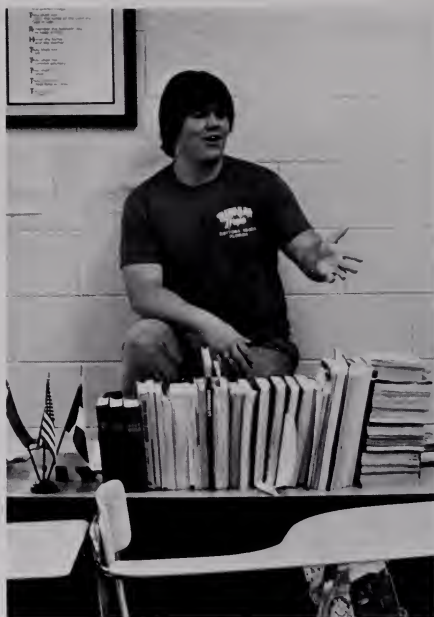

Pikeville High students will always be able to look back at their superb football team, as will the players themselves. Hold your heads high, Panthers, because you have done a fine job in representing your school!!!

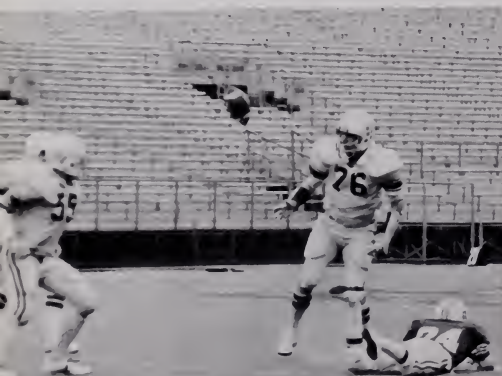

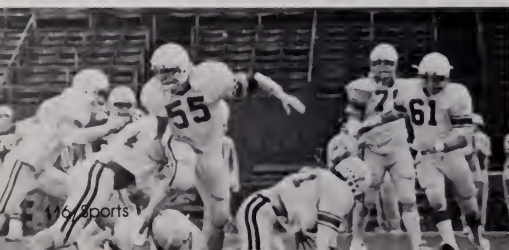

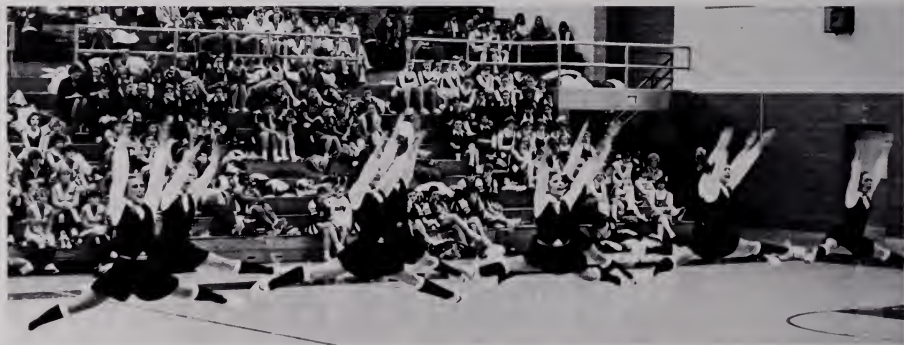

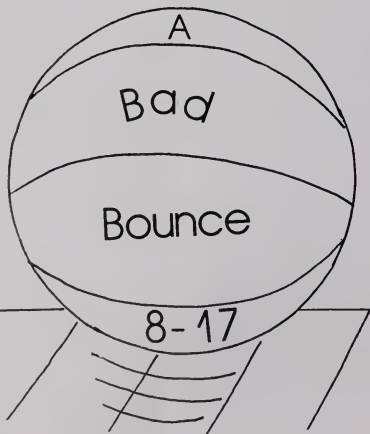

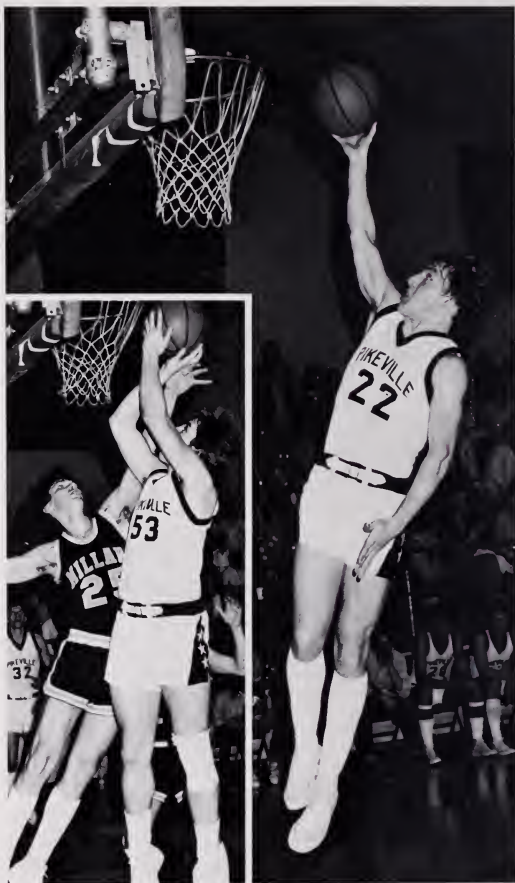

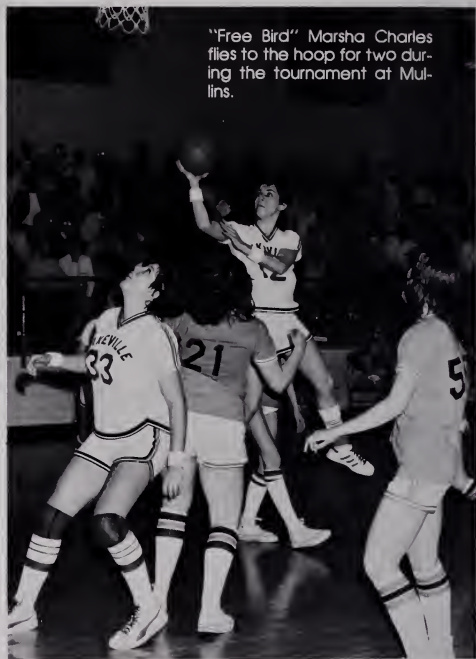

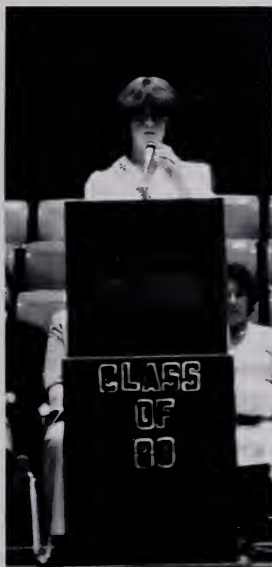

The six little league teams are as follows: Bullets, Celtics, Lakers, Seventy-sixers, Supersonics, and Trailblazers. The four mi-

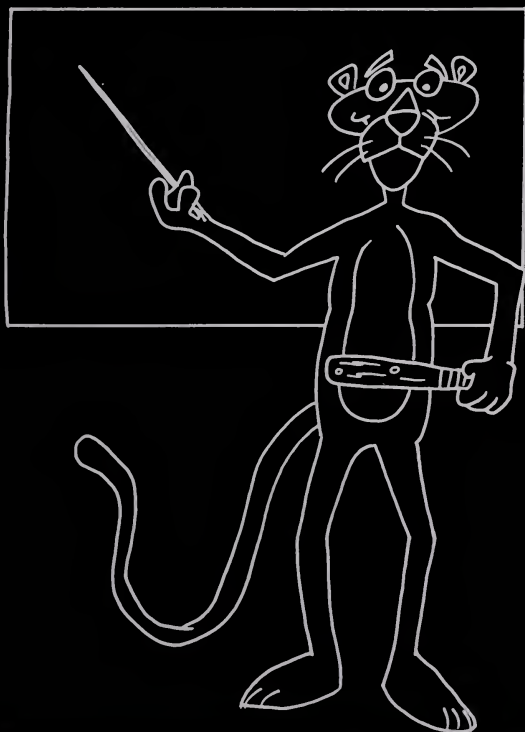
nor league teams are: Globetrotters, Jets, Pistons, and Wildcats.
