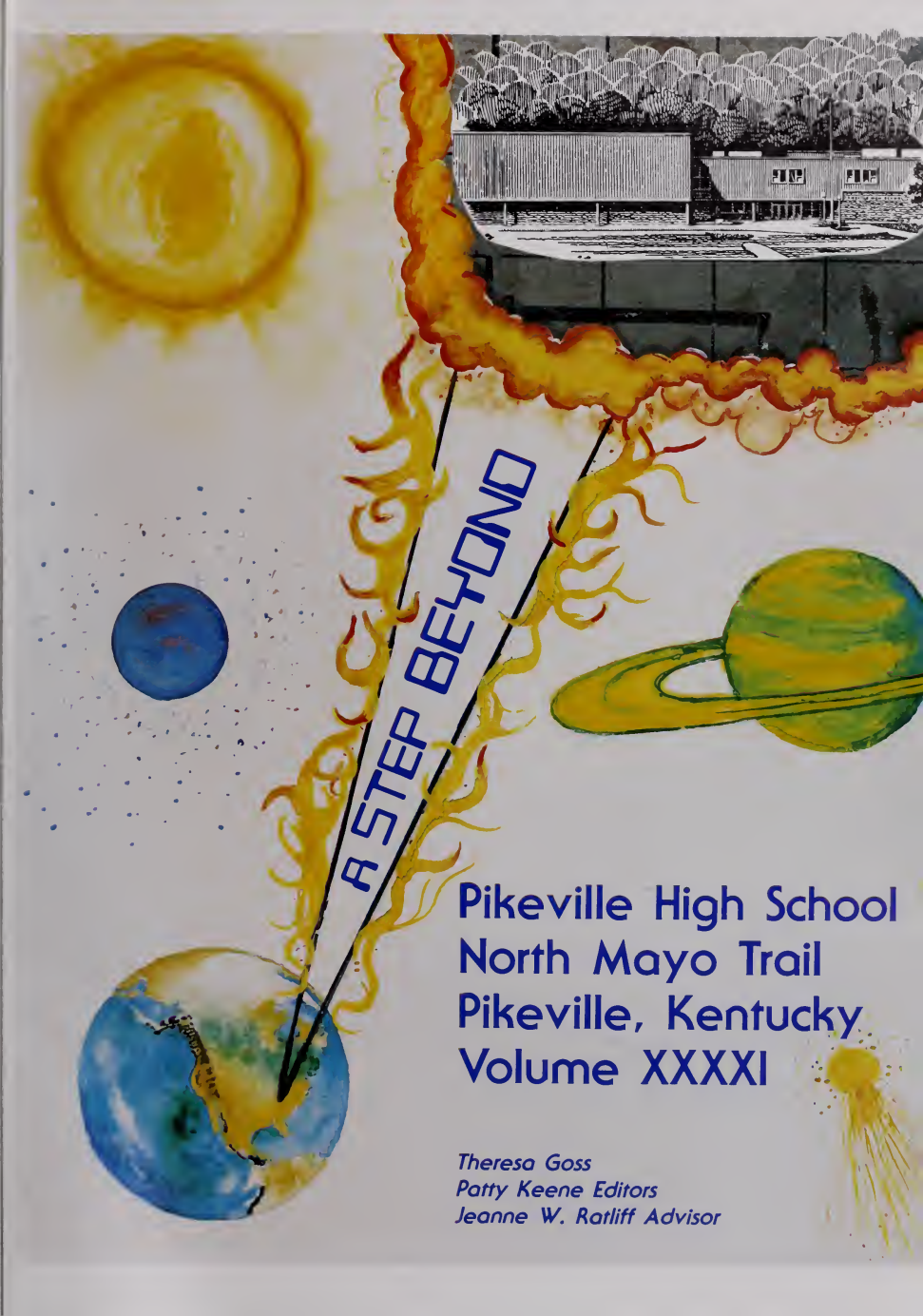

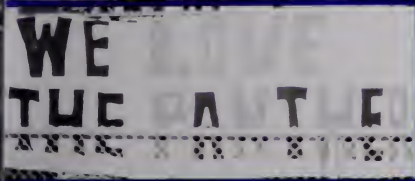

and a lot of telephone and T.V.





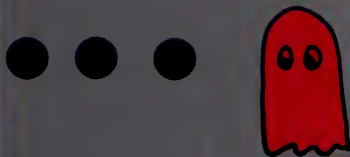
INVASION OF THE VIDEO CREATURES

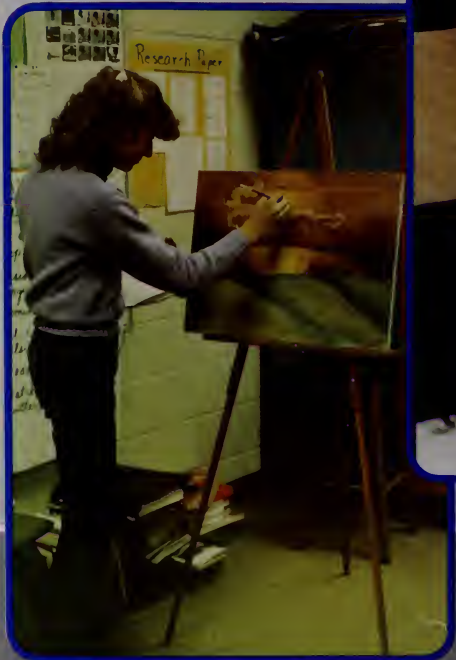

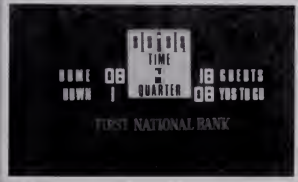


Juniors Destroy Senior's Forcefield

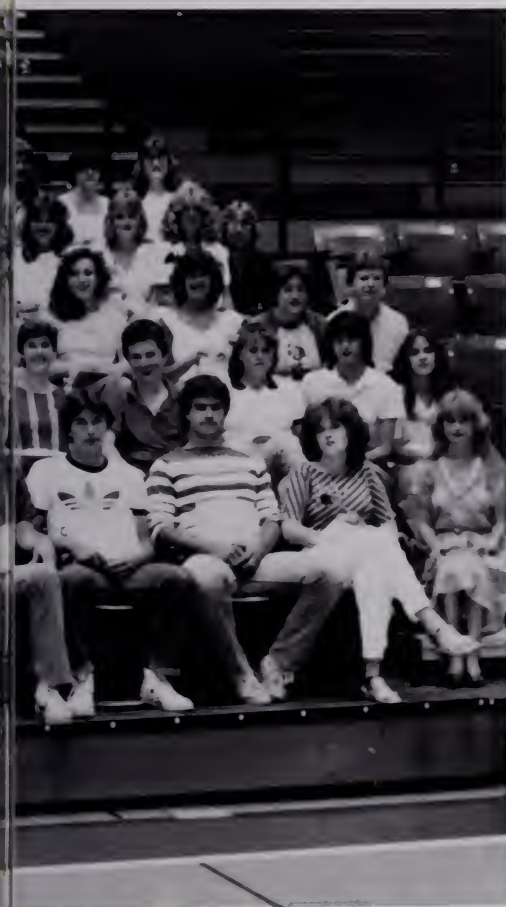
The annual Powder Puff game was played on Thursday, October 22, at 4:00. The mighty Junior girls dominated over the Senior girls by breaking through their forcefield.

Enthusiastic Students Launch Pikeville Tennis Club



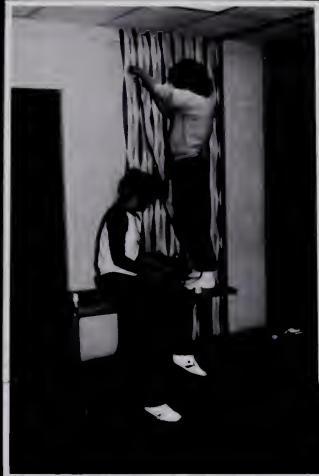

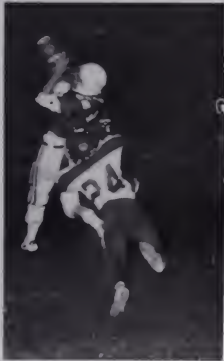
With the possibility of not getting into post-season play hanging over them like the Sword of Damocles,

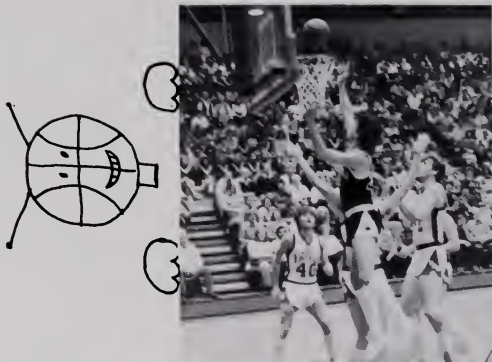
be stopped. The final score showed a 76-65 PHS loss.

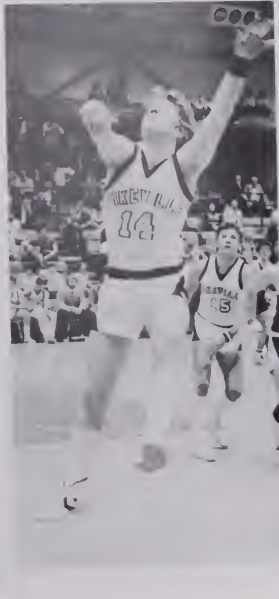
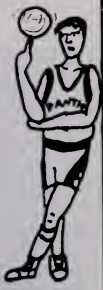

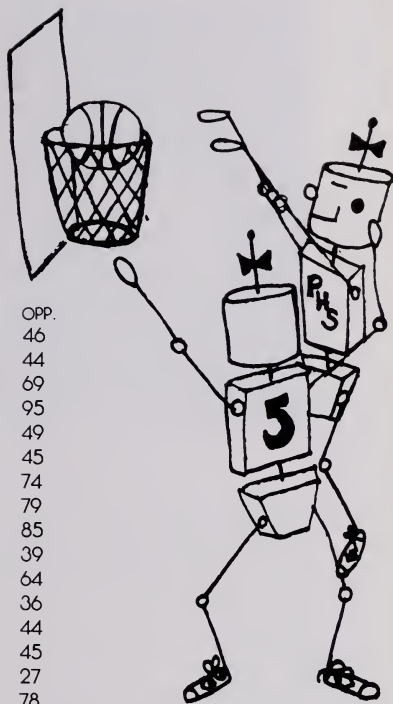

LADY PANTHERS LOSE HEARTBREAKER IN DISTRICT

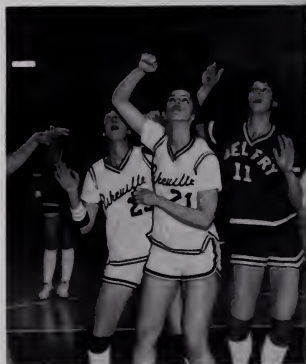

Terry Wright, and Andrew Joyce will be greatly missed in the athletic program at PHS. All three have star qualities and their futures look bright.



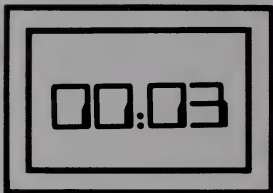

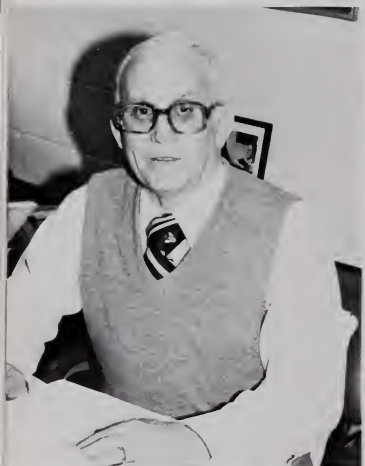




PHS Chosen For Model Architecture Program
