... IT'S YOUR PERSPECTIVE

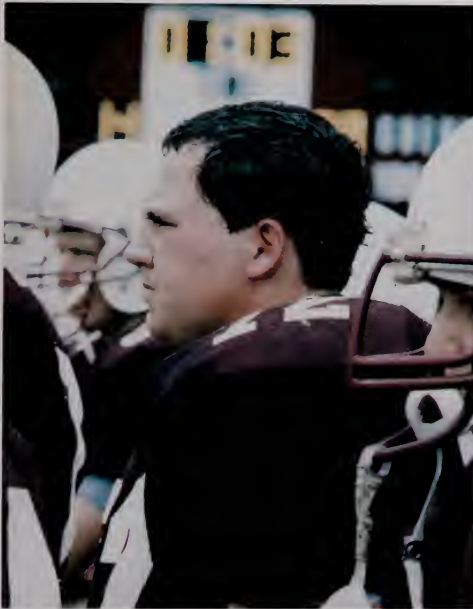

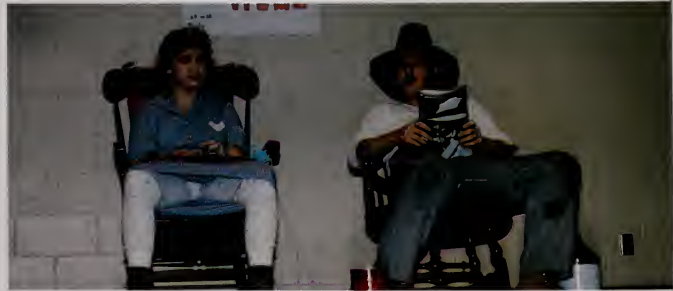

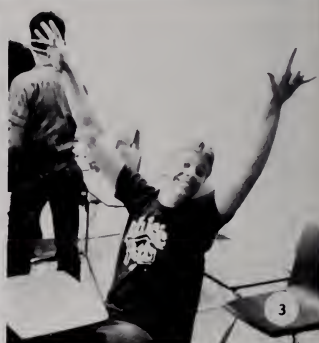

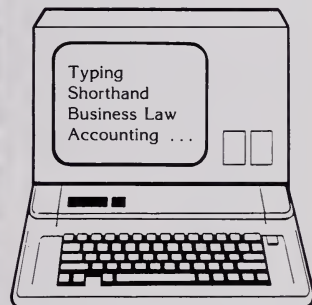

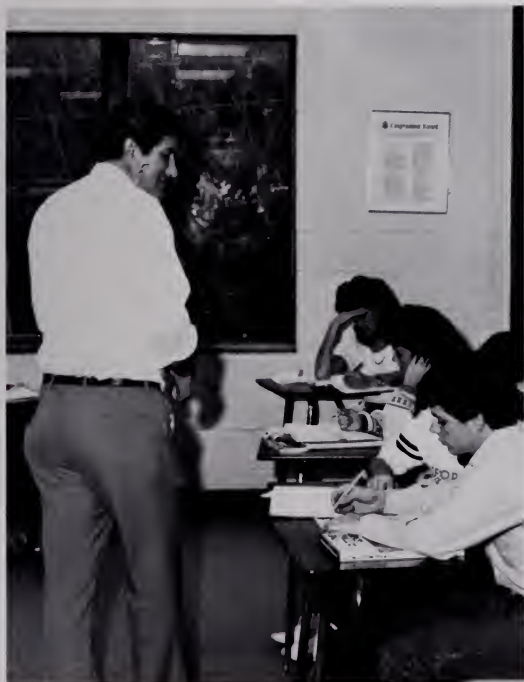

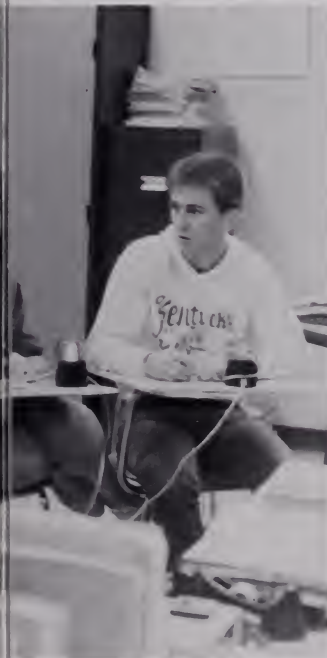

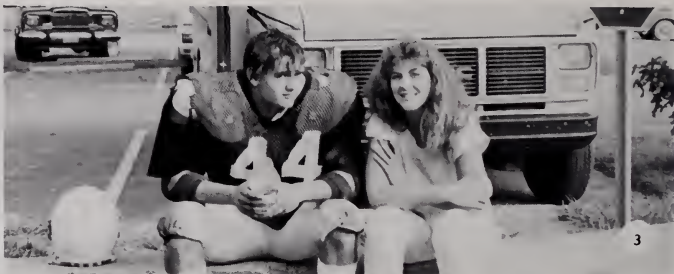

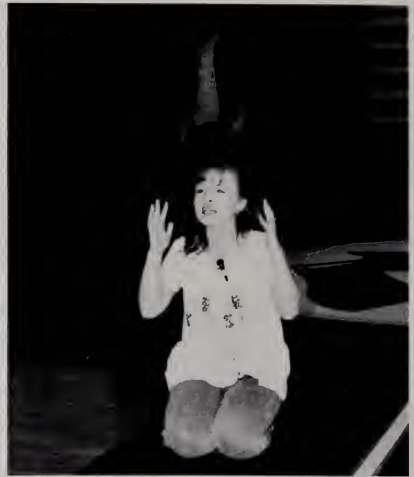

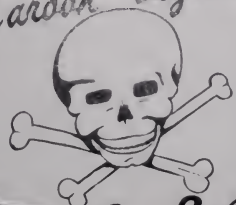
MAKING THE RULES

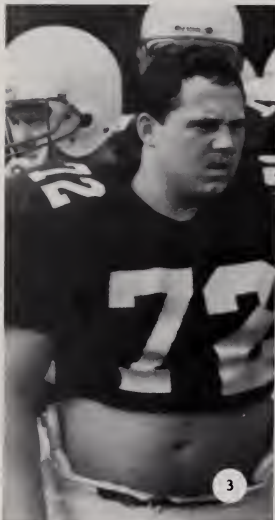

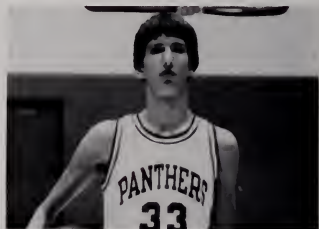

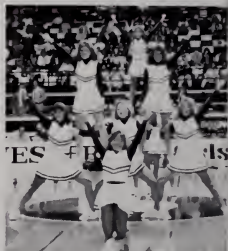

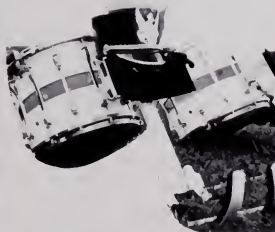

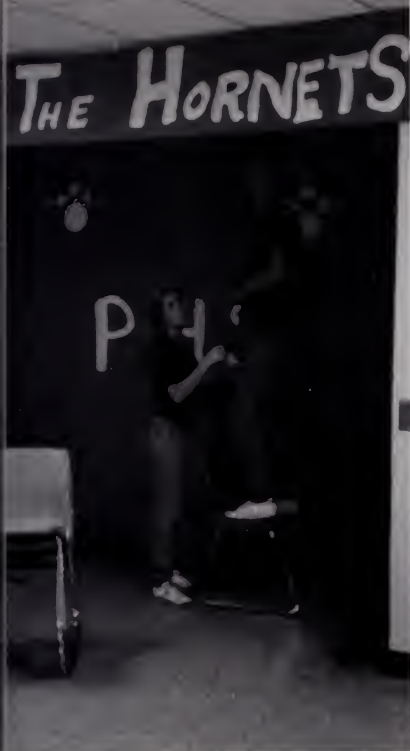

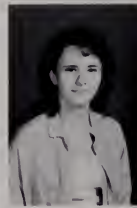

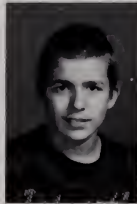

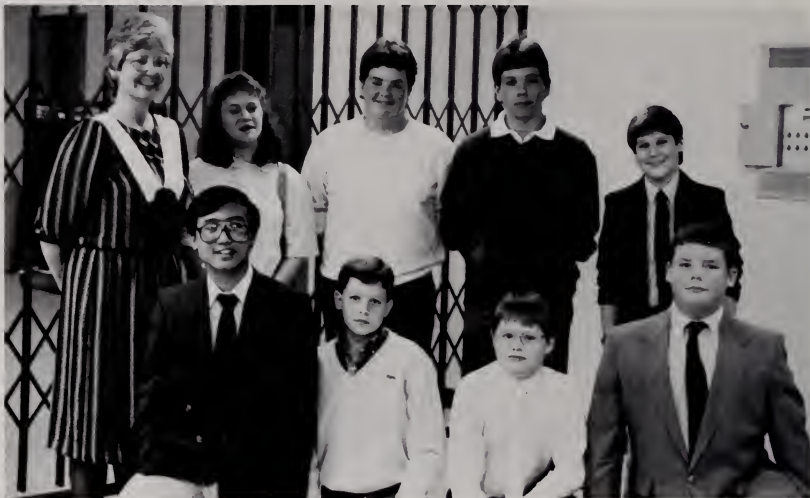

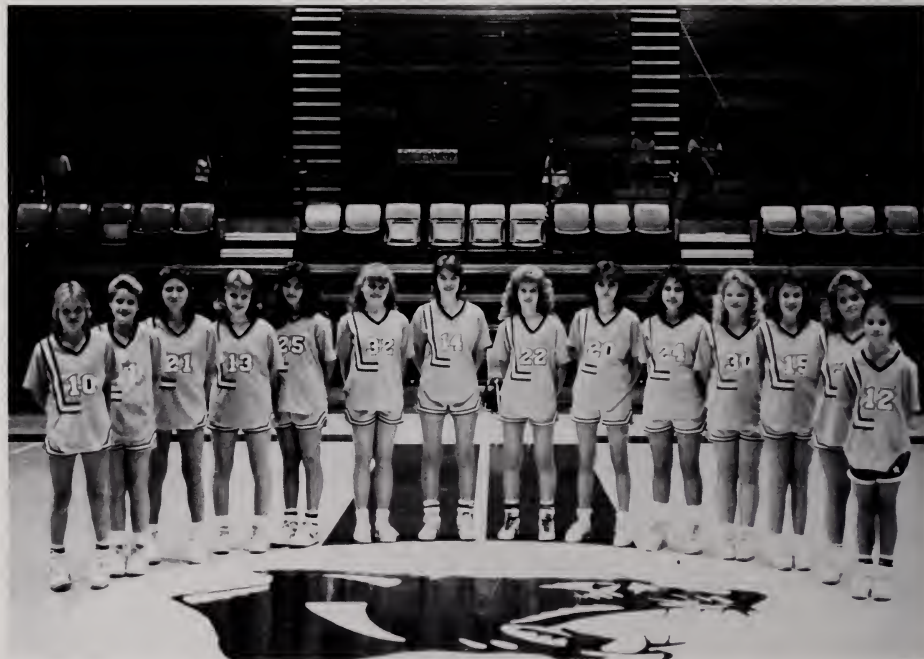

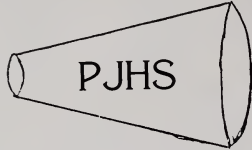
