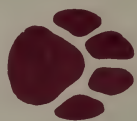

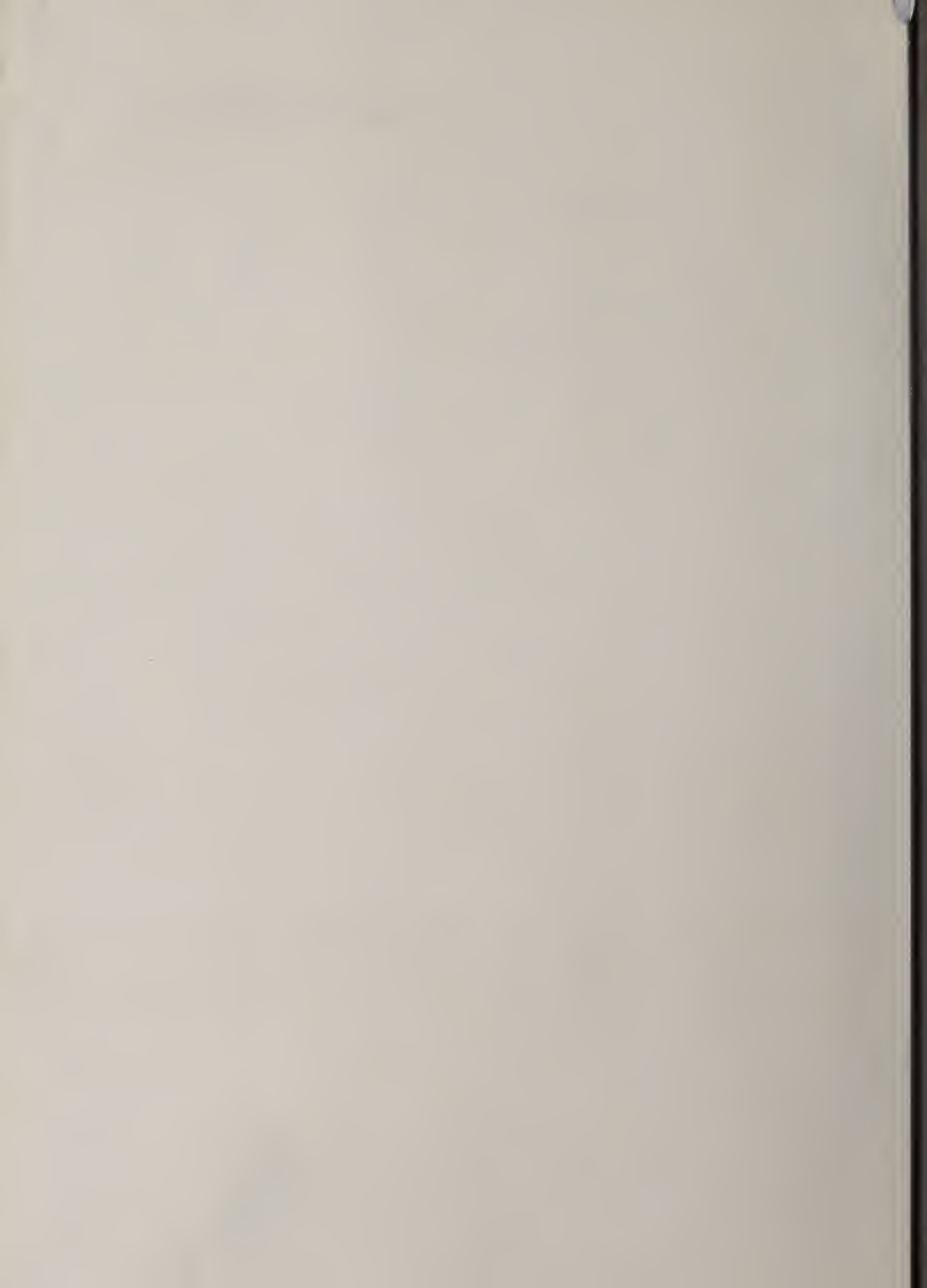

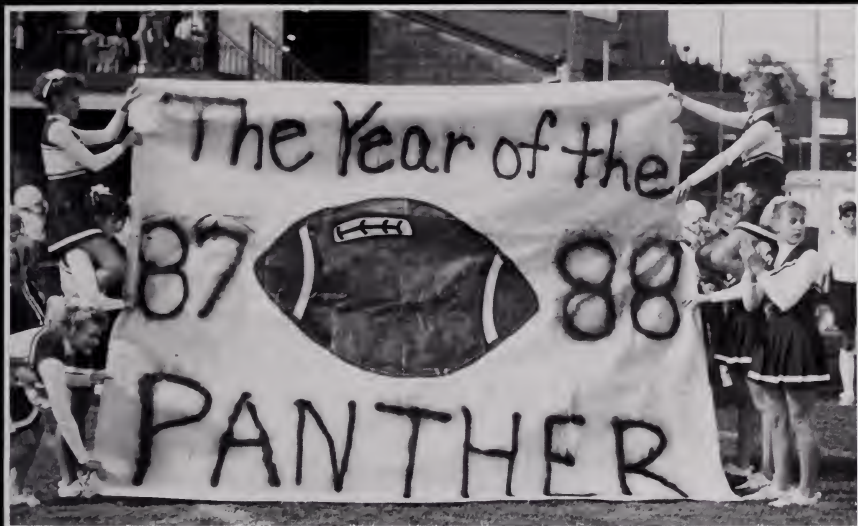

Jay Ramsey, Second grade student, only needs a kite to be a replica of Mr. Franklin himself.

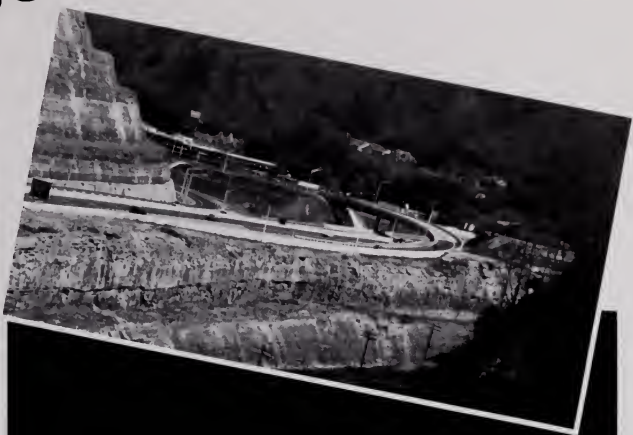


Looking back

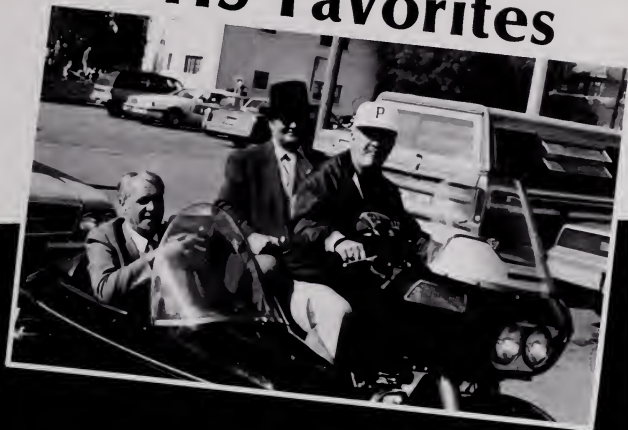

Hold On To The Night!!

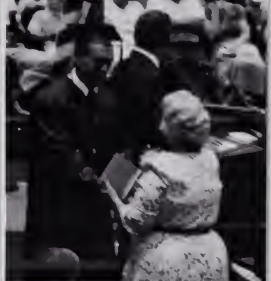

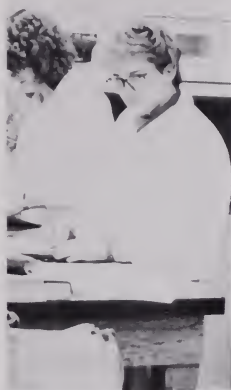

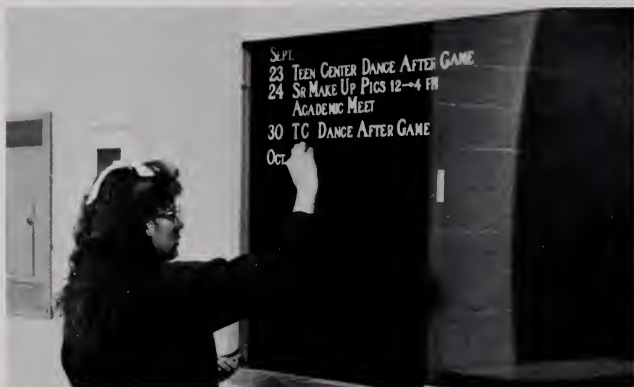

The 1987 Pikeville High School Football Team became the first Pikeville Athletic Team to win a State Championship, when they defeated Russelville 28-6 for the State Class A Championship. They finished the season 14-0, a school record for wins in a season. The '87 dream season began in frustration and controversy when the Pike County Bowl Game against Beechwood was called off at half-time due to a lightning storm. However, ecstasy replaced frustration when the Panthers claimed the State Crown. Pikeville averaged a whopping 49.6 points per game, setting a state scoring record, and it allowed its opponents only nine points per game. 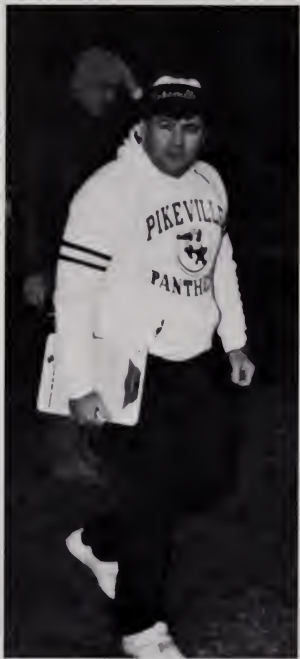

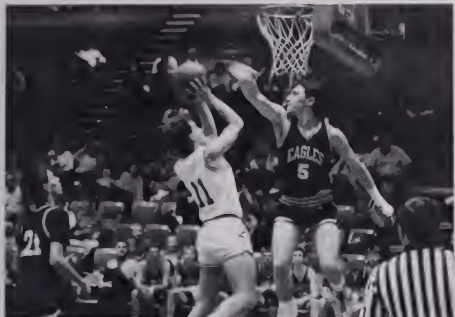

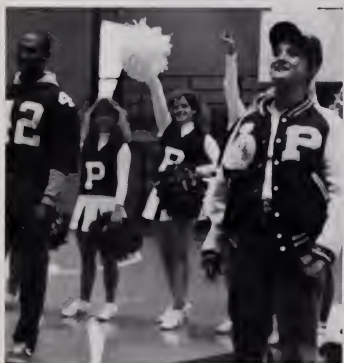

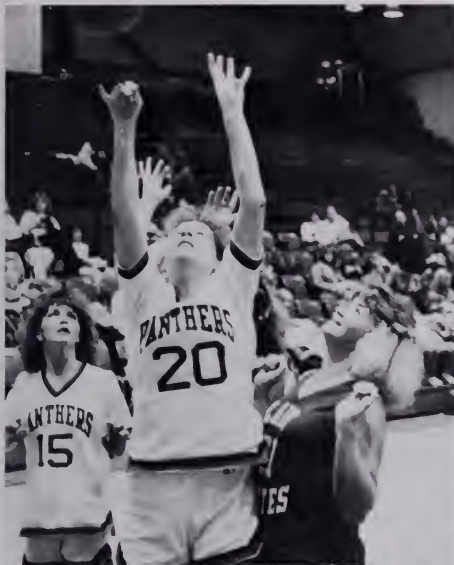

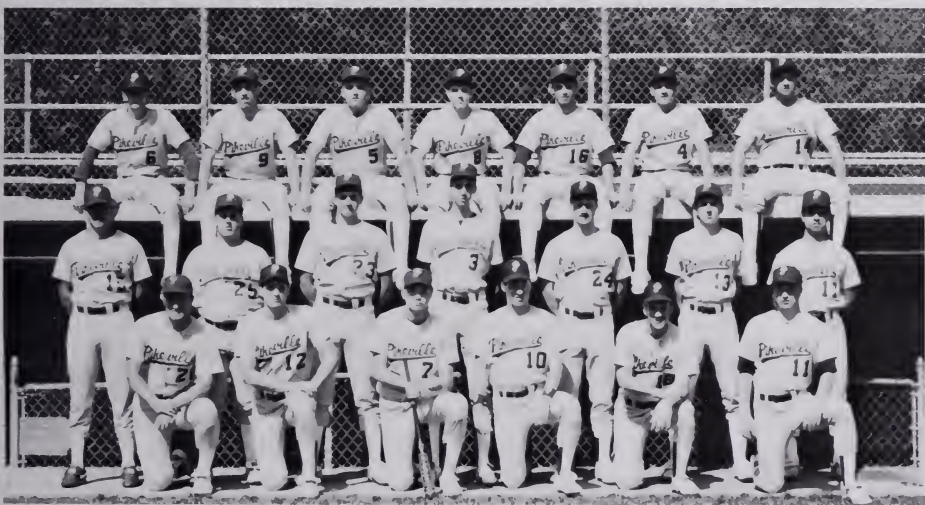

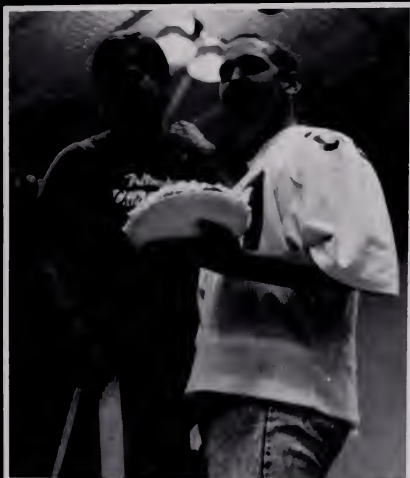

The exciting event was a total success; in which everyone, including the chaperones, seemed to enjoy.

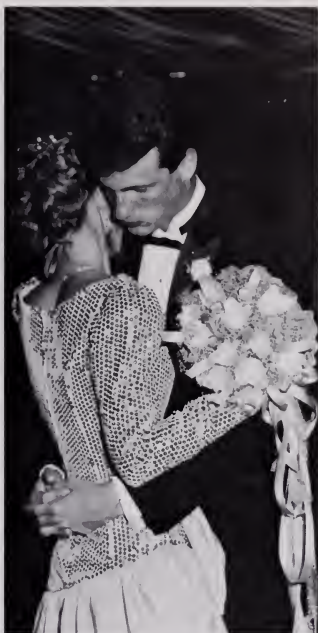

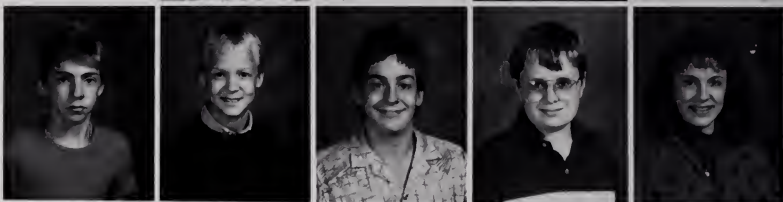

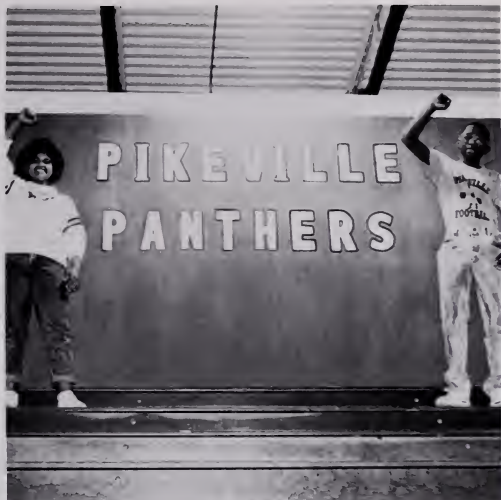

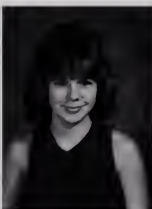

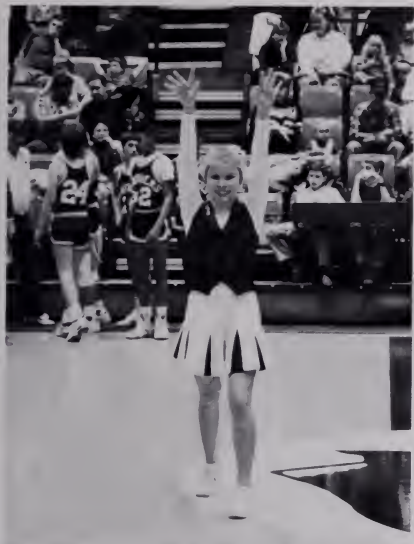


The Seventh Graders Participate In The Year Of The Panther

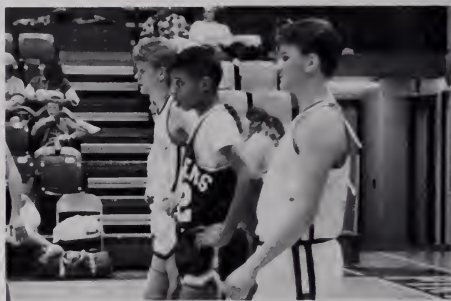

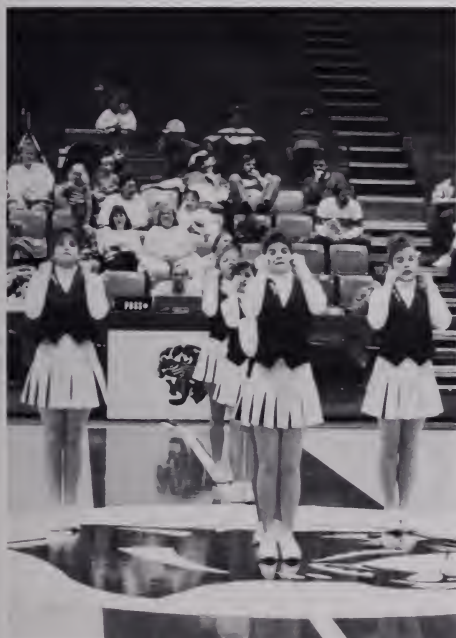

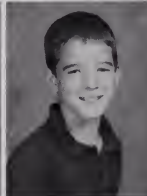
